PLANT MADE PHARMACEUTICALS

Hear this presentation during the Concurrent Session on Tuesday, September 24.

Everything we do on this planet begins with the process of photosynthesis. Photosynthesis absorbs and eliminates greenhouse gases, it provides food, fibre, clothing, structural materials and most recently biofuels. It is already the source of many pharmaceuticals and nutraceuticals and this will grow. But with a world population in excess of 6 billion people, every possible resource and innovation that agricultural biotechnology



can offer will be needed and stretched to its limits in the coming years. We continue to feed, clothe and heal people using agriculture-derived materials and we continue to tackle the biggest global problems of our day using the advanced, sustainable technologies intrinsic to Ag Biotech.

Moloney sees ABIC as the premier International Conference on Agricultural Biotechnology. "It is probably the only global venue where we can integrate discussion of cutting-edge science, innovation, product development and regulatory policy. This level of integration and interaction is critical to the industry, which has more opportunities now than ever (BioPharma, BioFuels, Nutraceuticals, Agricultural productivity) and yet we are still wrestling with

many challenges derived from disinformation circulated by opponents of Agricultural Biotechnology. I come to ABIC both to become informed about all the key issues confronting the industry now, as well as using the opportunity to contribute ideas to many of the areas above and especially to the area of policy and advocacy."

AGRI-BIOTECHNOLOGY AND THE DEVELOPING WORLD WITH AFRICAN FOCUS

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Hear this presentation during the Public Forum, Sunday, September 23 and the Plenary Session, Wednesday, September 25.

Although opinions differ regarding the role biotechnology can play in African development, all must agree about the urgency to eradicate the perpetual cycle of poverty, hunger, and malnutrition in Africa. It is an acknowledged fact that Africa is endowed with tremendous natural (including genetic) and human resources that are yet to be harnessed to the benefit of its people. Sadly, some of these resources have been declining and the trend is bound to accelerate unless urgent measures are taken to stop and reverse this drift. Since farming is the most important source of income and sustenance for about three quarters of the population of Sub-Saharan Africa, there is no doubt that agricultural biotechnology can make very substantial contributions toward increasing food production by rural resource-poor farmers, while preserving declining resources such as forests, soil, water, and arable land.

Dr. Wambugu says the ABIC conference is important because it ensures ongoing opportunities for continuous learning and networking within the agricultural biotechnology community. "The conference will be important because the topics that will be discussed and debated will range from Agriculture Biotechnology developments and their contribution to human and animal health; bioproducts and bio-economy; environment; crop and animal improvements; consumer perceptions and acceptance; to lessons learned since the launch of first products in mid 1990's."

Eligible students must submit a poster abstract that fits into one of three subject areas: Health and Agriculture (Food), Environment/Global Stewardship and Productivity/Quality. The top 10 relevant and appropriate abstracts will be selected, and these students will receive a free registration package to attend ABIC. Winners must provide a poster for display and be available to present their poster to conference participants during a designated time.

Eligibility: Students must be Canadian students/young scientists (a person who is no more than 2 years beyond the granting of their PhD by September 2007) and must be Canadian Nationals studying in Canada.

Deadline: Poster Abstracts Must Be Submitted by July 23, 2007
